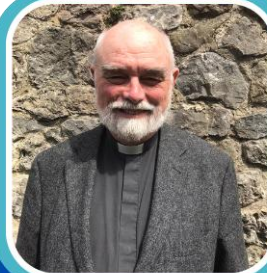

Vicar's letter from Revd Michael Darkins

Dear Friends,

I'm always minded that this time of year is about picking things up again. After the relative quietness of the summer holidays, our minds turn again to work, school, meetings and activities of various kinds, leading on, inevitably, to Christmas. Some of us find the thought of picking things up again to be exciting – blowing off the cobwebs! For others (and I'm probably including myself here), it's more like the agonising wait of trying to turn over an old engine, with each successive attempt bringing you closer to actually starting.

One of the things we can get going again is prayer. I don't mean to imply that we've all taken a holiday from prayer over the summer, but prayer is a habit that we can unintentionally get out of. Prayer is the lifeblood of our community; it's what sustains us in our life of faith, connects us to God in Jesus; and it attunes us to the work of the Spirit in our own lives, and in the life of our community.

I say this because September and the following months bring with them a whole host of new and returning initiatives, events and opportunities for mission. Just putting them in the diary and praying for them can make a world of difference to their impact, but also to your own prayer life. It's funny that in a world full of problems, we can all sometimes struggle to think what to pray for. But praying for specific dates can give us that focus on God and renew us. Take a look at our parish calendar, choose a few of the events, maybe even just one or two, and pray about them. Often, just a short, simple prayer is more than enough – usually my personal prayer is just, 'God, please do the thing. Amen.' When we can't find the words, God can.

So, as Paul commended the Thessalonians, 'pray without ceasing' (1 Thessalonians 5:17), watch, and wait for what God does for you, and our community.

Thoughts from St Michael's

As Hannah Hampton saved penalties during the lead-up and final of Euro 2025 it was a personal triumph for her and the nation. The 24-year-old goalkeeper has an eye condition that means she is unable to perceive depth, including the distance of 12



yards to the penalty spot. We are told that she has an inferiority complex, yet her former PE teacher said that she was incredibly determined.

In the Open Championship at Port Rush in Northern Ireland Scottie Scheffler, who won the tournament, said that the pleasure of victory was awesome for two minutes: 'At the end of the day, having success in life is not what fulfils the deepest desires of the heart. My greatest priorities are my faith and my family. Golf is third.' Rory McIlroy, whose chance of mounting a challenge disappeared despite winning the USA Open, was quoted as saying: 'I've got everything I wanted this week, apart from the winner's claret jug.'

Rachel Maskell MP says that she is Labour through and through. She has been campaigning on poverty for a decade but is one of four backbenchers suspended by Sir Keir Starmer for rebelling against cuts to disability benefits and the winter fuel allowance. She has spoken about how her Christian beliefs drive her politics. She sees frankness about faith as central to authenticity. 'Maybe some people don't do God, but God does us,' she says. 'Faith is there to be shared and give us hope.'

Now that the community garden around St Michael's has been established for a year it can be a place to stand or sit and reminisce about adversity, celebrate success and give us courage to speak to others about our faith and contribute to the community where people will recognise our faith.

Local dog Achilles is national champion

London, 3 July 2025 – In a heartwarming ceremony at the Palace of Westminster, history was made as Achilles, a spirited Norwich Terrier from Danson Primary School in Welling, Kent, was crowned the UK's first-ever School Dog of the Year. The award, launched by the National School Dog Alliance (NSDA) and supported by the All-Party Parliamentary Dog Advisory Welfare Group (APDAWG), celebrates dogs who are compassionately and ethically integrated into school life, making a measurable difference to student well-being, attendance, and learning.

Achilles, who works just two days a week to ensure his own well-being, has become a beloved fixture at Danson Primary. Part of the Canine Assisted Learning scheme, from greeting pupils at the school gate to handing out his signature 'Achilles Attendance' awards, he's more than a mascot, he's a motivator, a comforter, and a cherished member of the school community. 'From the moment he arrived, Achilles developed the most extraordinary rapport with the children,' said Mrs Anne Allen, Co-headteacher of Danson Primary and Achilles' guardian. 'His presence has helped increase attendance and resilience across the school. We hear time and again how he's boosting confidence, self-esteem, and a love for learning.'

The grand final, held on Thursday 3 July and hosted by media vet Dr Marc Abraham OBE, brought together educators, pupils, MPs, charities – and, of course, dogs – to celebrate the transformative role of school dogs across the UK.

Achilles is also a member of St Leonard's Church and puts his success down to the blessing he received in church a few days before the finalists' ceremony. He is well known in and around Hythe not only for his friendly loving nature and big brave name, but also because of his less common terrier breed.

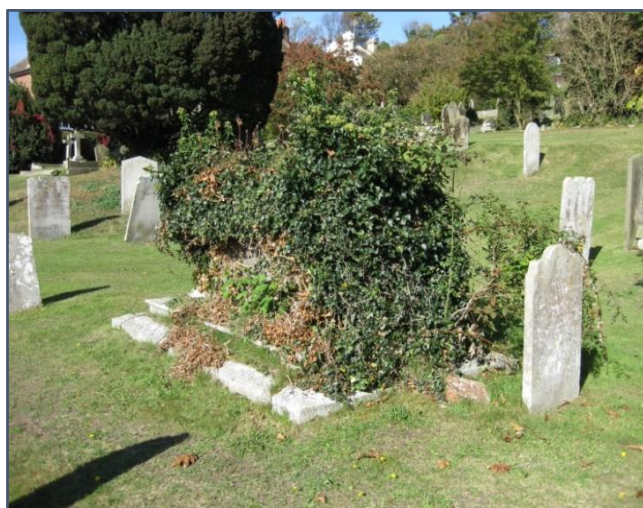
St Leonard's churchyard

The churchyard at St Leonard's is a green haven of peace within the Hythe conservation area. Containing some 700 graves (in its two sections), the churchyard has been closed to burials since 1912 (except for a few plots reserved for exclusive family use). The churchyard is under effective local government control with maintenance responsibility transferred to the local District Council (currently Folkestone & Hythe District Council), whose grounds maintenance team periodically mows and strims the grass and removes garden rubbish. All other work within the churchyard – such as raking mown grass and leaves, trimming hedges, pruning shrubs and trees, weeding and tidying around graves, and planting of daffodil bulbs – is undertaken by volunteers from within the congregation and local community.

Some 15 years ago, the churchyard was in a somewhat neglected condition with many graves and tombs (some partly collapsed) totally hidden within undergrowth or smothered by dense ivy growth – see sample photographs below.

Representatives of Hythe Civic Society and the PCC agreed that something had to be done, and so a joint initiative (with the invaluable support of two retired professional stonemasons) got under way to restore the churchyard to a respectable and attractive state once more.

Since then, local historian Anne Petrie has conducted a project to record the inscriptions on the gravestones and tombs in the churchyard and also research concise histories of some of the families who are known to have had significant connections with Hythe in the past. The results of this huge effort are compiled (together with cross-referenced plot maps showing the location of all the graves) within a ring-binder on display and available for reference on one of the cupboard units in the south-west aisle of the church. A complementary follow-on activity has been to photograph all legible inscriptions before time and weather cause the flaking away of lettering on some of the headstones.

The work of volunteers continues in the churchyard every Wednesday morning. Newcomers to our small team are always welcome. No specific skills are required – unlike in 1952 when the then Vicar appealed for support from anyone willing to wield a scythe to help prevent the churchyard grass growing!

History Corner

Hythe bells: a friendly follow-up

It was a pleasant surprise to find an article about our bells written by a non-ringer in the last Review, but of course we can't resist the temptation to add a few comments on the saga of the two poor-quality extra bells.

John Friend has not been forgotten by Hythe Ringers! Indeed, 130 years after the original event, we too had to have our cracked tenor bell recast – and, with the support of many local people and organisations, we funded and carried out the installation of 2 extra bells, lighter than the others and thus known as trebles. We have therefore been able to ring on 10 bells

for over 30 years and, whatever you think about the sound of bells, no one can argue that these are ill tuned.

The events of 1861 were not just a local cause celebre. John was a member of the Ancient Society of College Youths, a national society for top notch ringers, which still exists. Another member was George Stockham, who in effect acted as an agent between John and Mears, the Whitechapel foundry. Possibly because of this, the controversy became known nationally and has featured in various histories of ringing. Then, as in our more recent work, the bells were made up to a peal of 10, from 8, not 8 from 6, as erroneously stated in the recent Review article. In 1802 the 6 bells then in the tower had been recast into a peal of 8 by George Mears.

That's probably enough history for now. Perhaps the best reference for those interested is Dickon Love's website 'Love's guide to the church bells of Kent', which also details other Hythe bells which were recast, and the removal of the 2 trebles in 1891, a century before we started to install ours.

Alternatively, have a chat with our Tower Captain, Brian Butcher, who knows more about Kent bells than most. Perhaps he has an advantage as organiser and leader of the group of volunteers who work on bells across the county – he has supervised the removal or installation of over 300 bells. And there is scope for someone to widen the field of interest from the bells to the tower. This fell down in 1739. (*Not very subtle hint to Steve?!*)

A photo of John Friend in the ringing chamber is the only one we know of. His name is still quite frequently mentioned, though. When people are talking or moving about in the west vestry, below us, it can sound like someone coming up to join us. So, a ringer opens the door, only to find no one there. 'Ah,' said Richard Birch to Jane and me at our first practice here over 50 years ago, 'That's the ghost of John Friend!'

A generous gift to our church music

Beneath the organ pipes in St Leonard's Church is a handsome wooden panel with the inscription:

This organ, the gift of G L Mackeson and E Osborne/was dedicated by the Archbishop of Canterbury May 16 1936.

There are also some carved heraldic devices, which include the Arms of the Cinque Ports.

The donors of the organ were two local businessmen, George Lawrie Mackeson and Edward Osborne. George had been co-owner, with his brother Henry, of the Mackeson brewery in Hythe until its sale in 1920. He still lived in the town, at The Dene in Hillside Road with his wife Carlota. He was president of Hythe Cricket Club (his family then owned the cricket ground) and churchwarden of St Leonard's Church.

George died in 1950 and Carlota in 1960. Childless, their estate went to their nephews, Harry Ripley Mackeson, later MP for Hythe, and his brother. They sold the Dene in 1961 to Charlier & Co, local builders who created the existing development on the site of the demolished house.

Edward Osborne had spent his working life as a businessman and politician in Hong Kong but lived in North Road, Hythe, from about 1915. He became Borough Councillor and was mayor for two years from 1922. He also founded the Boys' Club in Portland Road and started a cabinet making workshop there for training boys in carpentry and joinery. The building is still called Osborne House.

The archbishop who dedicated the organ was Cosmo Lang, who created something of a stir later in 1936 when he openly criticised Edward VIII on his abdication. The following year he crowned George VI and his Queen in Westminster Abbey.
